- Over 20 children attended Sunday School Rally Day on September 10th.
- The Finance committee reported that a bequest has been received from the estate of Peggy Eppley.
- Jaime VanNostrand has begun reaching out to families of 8th-12th graders regarding the 2024 National Youth Gathering.
- The September 9th Community 5K raised \$1,600 for the Good News Home for Women. Council approved a matching gift of \$1,600 from Endowment Fund earnings for a total donation of \$3,200 from Zion to the Good News Home.
- The Worship & Music committee is sponsoring a youth-led service on Reformation Sunday, when our ninth-graders will be confirmed.
- The Stewardship committee's "Building Connections" online survey has been shared with the congregation. A paper version of the survey is available for those who prefer not to take the survey online.

Endowment Fund News

The final Endowment Sunday for 2023 will be All Saints Sunday, November 5th.



There was \$25,282 made available from the Endowment Fund earnings for new ministry opportunities in 2023. This is determined by taking 3% of a 3-year average of the fund. The Church Council is open to suggestions on ways to the funds to support our ministries. YTD \$1,500 has been donated to the New Jersey Synod Compensation Aid Fund, \$5,000 to Lutheran Disaster Response, \$396.77 to purchase Prison

Prayer Books, \$325 for ELCA Good Gifts and \$3,090 to Family Promise (in honor of Zion's 309th anniversary), leaving a current balance of \$14,970.23 available to support 2023 ministries.

Please consider giving to the Zion Lutheran Church Endowment Fund on November 5th to celebrate All Saints Sunday or to commemorate and celebrate a significant milestone in your family's church life such as a baptism, confirmation or wedding. Always keep in mind that the Endowment Fund only grows with contributions from members and friends of Zion — those who share the vision of not only a living memorial for loved ones, but also recognize that upon maturity, the fund will provide significant monetary grants for many new mission-oriented programs, forever.

Update on the Fire Code Violation by Helen Livingston, Property Committee Chairperson

At the Annual Meeting of our congregation held in January 2023, and again following the Palm Sunday church service on April 2, 2023, discussion was held with the congregation regarding the citation the church received from the Tewksbury Township Fire Marshal, as we are in violation of the 1985 New Jersey Administrative Code which requires any facility that has the ability to hold more than 50 people to have a minimum of two means of egress.

A historic preservation architect was hired by Zion's Council — a design for a door was developed, and two areas in the church building were identified as possible locations for the second door. There was much discussion at both meetings about the possibility of filing a variance due to the historical nature of our church building and the desire not to make any alterations to the building's current layout. After much research and consideration, and after discussion at the April meeting, the Council decided not to



seek a variance because 1) many in the congregation do not want a variance filed because they are in favor of having a second exit for the safety of our congregation; 2) we would not get approval of the variance using an argument based around the historic nature of our church building, since major renovations have already been done 1831, 1854 and again in 1883; and 3) the variance request would need to be submitted by an architect and our architect stated he would not file the request because he could not, in good conscience, ask for something that would put our congregation in harm's way, and he would not stake losing his architect's license by requesting something that would be a health and safety hazard and violate NJ code.

Recently, the Fire Marshal who submitted the original citation resigned his position to take a job in another town. The question has been asked by some congregation members whether we could decide not to move forward with addressing the citation at all given the resignation of the Fire Marshal. This is not an option, since the citation has been registered with the New Jersey Division of Fire Safety which means it must be resolved. If we do not move forward, we may face significant fines.

It's hard to imagine making extensive alterations to our church building. I believe there must have been much discussion and even dissent among our predecessors in 1831 when the decision was made to move the pulpit, punch a new entrance into the west wall (now, the rear of the church) and to place a window on the south wall (facing Church Street) where the original entrance had been. I'm imagining many concerns were expressed in 1854 when the decision was made remove the entire west wall to create the narthex and add the steeple, and again in 1883 when it was decided to remove the east wall to create the altar area at the front of the sanctuary. After all these changes, Zion's building was no longer the church it had once been, but it is the church we know and love today.

The Council has heard from some church members asking why the second egress is even necessary given that nothing bad could ever happen to us here in Oldwick. Unfortunately, in this day and age, it would be irresponsible of us to have that mindset not only for our present congregation, but also for those who will come to Zion after we have gone. A recent Washington Post article reported that 34 fires occur at religious institutions each week. In only the last few years, Peace Lutheran Church in New Mexico was set on fire while worshipers were present, and recently, just in January 2023, Abiding Love Lutheran Church in Colorado had multiple Molotov Cocktails thrown into the church building during services which set off multiple fires. That church had a sprinkler system and multiple means of egress. Zion does not. A second door is a necessity for the safety of all of us. And in the eyes of the congregation who will come after us, it will be just another door in a beautiful building.

Military Recognition Care Packages

Zion is proud and appreciative of its long history of military service, our current members who have served, and those friends and family who are currently serving.

With your help, the Parish Life committee is continuing the work that began in 2018 with our Military Recognition project. The fifth annual project kicked off on Memorial Day 2023 with posts on Facebook and cards sent to those friends of Zion who are currently serving. In November, we will send care packages to these same currently-serving members. We have scaled down the size of the packages so this year we are only asking for donations of gift cards.

This year's Military Recognition project will culminate on the Sunday before Veteran's Day when our veterans will be recognized and the care packages will be blessed. Next Steps for Resolving Fire Code Violation by Leah Wintemute

My thanks to Helen Livingston for her many tireless hours of work on resolving the fire code violation. I want to share some information with all of you about our next steps.

As Helen noted in her article on page 4, following the Palm Sunday church service on April 2, 2023, Council hosted an informational meeting regarding the two options for a secondary egress from the church building which was cited by the fire marshal as a violation of NJ code and which we were required to address. Council wanted to obtain feedback from the congregation to see which option would suit the needs and desires of the congregation the best. Approximately 40 parishioners attended the meeting and there was much discussion on why we were required to add this secondary egress and the pros and cons of each of the options presented. At the end of the discussion, the congregation requested that drawings be developed for each option and contractor bids obtained so that Council, on behalf of the congregation, would have as much information as possible before making a final decision.

Before the meeting ended, a straw poll was taken for each of the two egress options we received from the architect with a tally of 18 votes for a side door placement and 13 votes for a chancel door placement. When introducing the straw poll, I explained that we want every voice heard in a project of this size and nature before Council votes on a solution. In the five months since that meeting, the secondary egress has been on the agenda at every Council meeting and has been discussed with comments from the congregation brought to our attention. Unfortunately, as in any building project, there are delays, and this has happened in gathering contractor bids for the two options. As soon as we have the requested cost information, we will again convene a special meeting of the congregation to see where the heart of the congregation lies. Ultimately, though, it will be Council who takes the final vote on this issue since that is their responsibility as the elected officials of Zion. So, it is imperative that all members prayerfully consider how this safety issue may be resolved with consideration of our current members and also the future members of Zion, and take part in the discussions to make your voice heard.

"All Creation Sings" A New Hymnal Supplement

This supplement is meant to be used in conjunction with the hymnal that is familiar to many of us, "Evangelical Lutheran Worship," which we often refer to as the "ELW" or "red hymnal."

God calls us to be people of resurrection, stirring up new life in every aspect of our life together, including in worship. This month, we are offering two opportunities for you to hear and learn a little more about this new hymnal supplement, "All Creation Sings."

On Sunday, October 8th, members of our Worship & Music committee will provide temple talks during both worship services that will mention this new hymnal and the opportunity it presents for us to sing a new song. **On Sunday, October 15**th, Rod Briscoe, our Director of Music, will give an introduction to the hymnal, including some background on its compilation and a sampling of its music, at 9:45 a.m. in the Christian Education Building and at 12:00 p.m. at church.

We hope that these opportunities to engage with this new resource will build excitement as we prepare to add the hymnal supplement to the pews in the month of November. All Creation Sings will not replace the ELW, but will be an added resource for our worship services. I pray that your hearts will be opened to singing a new song as we renew our praises to God.


