


Church Council Highlights



They now have the peace of mind knowing that their dogs will have a lifetime of loving care, companionship with staff and other dogs, and engage in enriching activities in a specially designed facility. \$10- Pedals for Progress

In addition to using a bicycle for basic transportation, there are many ways new or refurbished bicycles can be put to good use thanks to Pedals for Progress, which has been operating since 1991. Nonprofit partner organizations in these and other countries train children and adults in bicycle repair and maintenance and are provided with the necessary parts, tools, lubricants, and accessories. \$15- Prison Fellowship Angel Tree

The Prison Fellowship Angel Tree program recognizes the importance of strengthening and maintaining the bond between an incarcerated parent and their children. This is one of the vital, Christ centered nationwide programs offered to prisoners and their families by the

Prison Fellowship Ministries, founded in 1976 by Charles Colson. Through partnership with churches, groups, and other organizations, the Angel Tree programs strive to enhance this bond. The Angel Tree enables churches and other groups to purchase gifts and include a personal message of love on behalf of the parents. Angel Tree Camping provides scholarships for children, partnering with churches, to attend Christ centered camps. The Angel Tree Sports Camp sponsors day camps in a variety of sports. The Angel Tree Everyday encourages congregations to integrate the Angel Tree families into their churches' year-round programs. For more information, visit www.prisonfellowship.org.

\$20- ELCA Good Gifts - School Fees & Uniforms for Girls

The ELCA hopes to make a difference in the lives of girls whose educational opportunities are impacted by poverty. Worldwide, struggling families find the associated costs of educating children, paying school fees and buying uniforms, a burden. Often, their sons whose earning potential is thought to be greater may be chosen over their daughters to continue their education. The daughters from these impoverished families who drop out of school are more likely to be forced into child labor, marry at a



young age and become pregnant with complications, be victims of domestic violence, and suffer with malnourishment. The future for girls who remain in school is brighter with employment opportunities, with health, safety, and prosperity for their families, and an ability to contribute to the welfare of their community. Adopt-a-Family Thanksgiving Meals



Stewardship Review

Third Quarter General Fund Giving-2023

Our 2023 Spending Plan was based on an income of \$364,000 from projected member giving. This amount was determined from having received pledges from 46 families at \$274,000 and an estimate of \$90,000 from 47 non-pledging families. In December, we received checks for pre-pledges at \$58,500. Through September, eight families have met their total 2023 pledge. We have received a total of \$287,500 or 79% of our year-end estimate.



- Twenty-eight families have met or are ahead of pledge by \$28,000. Most of the surplus is from the 8 families who have completed their pledges (\$27,100).
- On the flip side, 18 pledging families are below their year-to-date pledge by \$11,600. Seven of the families who pledged (7.5%) have made no contribution to our operating expenses.
- Actual giving from pledging families (\$222,000) is at 108% of our 3rd quarter milestone.
- Actual non-pledged income (\$65,600) is at 97% of the expected 3rd quarter milestone.
- Actual total giving (\$287,500) is at 105% of the 3rd quarter milestone.

Additional Generosity

Members have provided support in areas outside of the General Fund.

- Members have given \$15,200 in support of 12 special appeals
- Members have given \$11,400 in support of Memorials and various other areas.
- Including General Fund donations, total giving to all causes is \$314,100.

Making Ministry Happen

We pray you will continue to give generously from your heart to make ministry happen at Zion. On Commitment Sunday, 18 families committed to support our 2024 ministries with pledges totaling \$55,562. Pledge cards are still being received — please bring yours to church or send to the Parish Office as soon as you can.



Endowment Sunday — November 5th

The final Endowment Sunday for 2023 will be All Saints Sunday, November 5th.

There was \$25,282 in earnings from the Endowment Fund available for new ministry opportunities in 2023. This is determined by taking 3% of a 3-year average of the fund. The Church Council is open to suggestions on ways to use the funds to support our ministries. YTD \$1,500 has been donated to the New Jersey Synod Compensation Aid Fund, \$5,000 to Lutheran Disaster Response, \$396.77 to purchase Prison Prayer Books, \$325 for ELCA Good Gifts – Vulnerable LGBTQ Youth, \$3,090 for Family Promise (in honor of Zion's 200th applications).



The Endowment Committee would like to thank all who donated on Mother's Day, Father's Day and throughout the year.

Please consider giving to the Zion Lutheran Church Endowment Fund on November 5th to celebrate All Saints Sunday or to commemorate and celebrate a significant milestone in your family's church life such as a baptism, confirmation, or wedding. Always keep in mind that the Endowment Fund only grows with contributions from members and friends of Zion – those who share the vision of not only a living memorial for loved ones, but also recognize that upon maturity the fund will provide significant monetary grants for many new mission-oriented programs ... forever.

Rev. Mark Summer shared this reflection at Mary Ann's committal service on October 15th
